





Students Have Two Hours to Create a Seaworthy Structure

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The whistle blows and they're off: cardboard boats glide to the finish line on the other side of the pool, their builders madly paddling for all they're worth. For those with good designs and construction (and maybe a bit of luck), the cardboard vessels not only make it across the pool, they also hold the weight of team members as they pile in, one by one.

Skills Ontario hosts Cardboard Boat Races and associated Video Production Challenges to create a practical, tangible, and fun way to introduce students to the design, building, and effective teamwork skills necessary for working in the skilled trades and technologies.

Both primary and secondary schools participate on separate days. Teams of four are provided all the necessary materials to build a boat in just two hours. Students must bring their problem-solving, teamwork, and design skills as they create a seaworthy structure out of corrugated cardboard and duct tape. Sponsored by 3M and Norampac Cascades, Skills Ontario Cardboard Boat Races will draw over 1800 competitors in 14 cities from 250 schools in Ontario.

Meanwhile, teams of two record their boat building peers' progress from the construction stage to the races to capture the best video of the action. The student videographers then edit and produce a mini-documentary at their schools. Each production is judged and the winners are selected.
