The organization Ray was one of the original founders of started with the name "Skills Canada", and with its success, the organization grew and dispersed across the country. Today, every province has its own Skills organization, along with a national organization that was later formed that now holds the name "Skills Canada." Every day, youth across the country are given opportunities to explore careers in the skilled trades and technologies, and none of it would be possible without Ray's vision and contributions thirty years ago in Barrie, Ontario.

Ray played a momentous role in transforming Skills Ontario from its early beginnings to the influential and impactful organization that it is today.
