## Skills Ontario announces winners advancing to championship round of its province-wide Paper Glider Competition

Paper Glider Competition program aims to encourage and develop youth's knowledge of skilled trades and technologies

**Ontario (January 21, 2021)** – In collaboration with the Government of Ontario, Bombardier and 3M Canada, Skills Ontario was pleased to announce the regional winners of its Paper Glider Competition on Skills Ontario's YouTube channel today, whereby 31 participants are moving to the Championship Round. Launched in October 2020, the Paper Glider Competition program aims to encourage and develop youth's knowledge of skilled trades and technology by challenging students to design and build a glider plane made from paper products, toothpicks, and skewer sticks.

Along with a video submission of their paper plane taking flight, students must provide a completed safety checklist and questionnaire provided by Skills Ontario to test their familiarity with skilled trades and technology careers and the pathways into these fields. Participants are graded on their ability to build according to their plans, overall construction and durability of the paper plane, as well as how far it flies.

"Skills Ontario works to continue providing interactive learning opportunities to youth so that they can develop their skills and feel inspired throughout their career exploration, and one of the ways we've done that is through the new Paper Glider Competition," says Ian Howcroft, CEO of Skills Ontario.
