
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## **CONTINUED SUCCESS IN THE VIRTUAL WORLD**

After the sudden shift to virtual learning, Skills Ontario further amplified its already wide-reaching online presence and developed its in-person programming to be available through the new virtual world, along with creating new initiatives.



On Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, TikTok, and LinkedIn, Skills Ontario engages thousands of followers daily to promote programs, events, challenges, opportunities, and more.



#### **EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATIONS**

Skills Ontario reaches students through In-School Presentations, with Liaison Officers visiting schools throughout the school year.

When the pandemic drastically changed our circumstances, Skills Ontario adapted its In-School Presentation program to be delivered virtually. Our presentation educates students on the hundreds of career opportunities available in the construction, motive power, service, industrial, and technology sectors, focusing on apprenticeships, training programs, and more. This presentation is updated annually and is available in both English and French, as well as in a workshop format geared toward First Nations, Métis, and Inuit audiences.

Along with this student-focused presentation, Skills Ontario also developed a virtual presentation for parents/guardians to learn more about careers in the skilled trades and technologies and the pathways into these fields.







#### YOUNG WOMEN'S INITIATIVES

Skills Ontario's Young Women's Initiatives saw another successful year alongside its Collaborating Organizations, hosting virtual Career Exploration Events, the International Day of The Girl virtual activity series, the International Women's Day Conference, and the Young Women's Conference, which we also hosted entirely in French as part of our commitment to delivering programming to the Francophone community.

Skills Ontario also smashed a Guinness World Records Achievement for "Longest Online Video Chain of People Passing and Using a Screwdriver." While this event was focused on women in skilled careers, all were welcome to participate.

Skills Ontario also partnered with Girl Guides of Canada to deliver a virtual workshop for young women in August. Every participant earned a badge for their involvement.





## FIRST NATIONS, MÉTIS, AND INUIT INITIATIVES


Skills Ontario delivers programming to Indigenous youth through its First Nations, Métis, and Inuit (FNMI) Initiatives. With Trades & Tech Days, Indigenous College Recruiter Information Sessions, and the First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Student Conference.

These programs are for Indigenous youth to learn about the skilled trades and technologies and to hear from community members who work in these fields.

#### 2021 VIRTUAL SKILLS ONTARIO COMPETITION

The 2021 Virtual Skills Ontario Competition was a great success with 12,000 participants logged in on the day of the event, and 51,500 visits to partner's Exhibitor Booths. Over 500 competitors in skilled trade and technology contests in fields such as welding, photography, bricklaying, hairstyling, and more participated between April 22nd to May 7th, with the public competition viewing and Career Exploration Showcase on May 12th, and the provincial Closing Ceremony on May 13th.

Skills Ontario is thrilled to celebrate all competitors, including those who represented Team Ontario at the 2021 Skills Canada Virtual National Competition, which virtually hosted participants from across the country to compete.

At Skills Canada's Closing Ceremony on June 15th, Team Ontario achieved 29 medals: nine gold medals, eleven silver medals, and nine bronze medals.

## **DISCOVERY DAYS & OUTREACH EVENTS**

Among Skills Ontario's new initiatives is a Discovery Day program, which creates a virtual career exploration experience for attendees. Participants can attend conferences, visit exhibitor booths, and collect virtual items to fill their digital swag bag.

2,000+ total participants attended a **Discovery Day this past year.** partners hosted virtual exhibitor booths. new outreach events were held this past year.

Skills Ontario has held Discovery Days for New Canadians, as well as region-focused events for residents in Cornwall, Prescott-Russell, Far Northwestern Ontario, and more.



#### PERSONS WITH EXCEPTIONALITIES CONFERENCE

Skills Ontario held its first ever Persons with Exceptionalities Conference in March 2021. This event was for youth in grades 7-10, parents, guardians, support staff and educators. ASL interpretation was provided and participation was free.

Attendees joined to hear inspirational success stories from mentors, learn about available resources and support services, and discover exciting and rewarding career options in skilled trades and technologies.







#### VIRTUAL CHALLENGES & WORKSHOPS

In March 2020, Skills Ontario developed a virtual challenge series. Up until June 2021, Skills Ontario regularly launched challenges related to the skilled trades and technologies that Ontarians could do at home.

Prior to the pandemic, Skills Ontario held week-long day-camps across Ontario. Skills Ontario continued the initiative virtually, leading participants through fun activities and virtual tours.

Participants created their own camp schedules throughout the summer and March break sessions based on activities that piqued their interest. After school sessions were also added to allow participants to continue learning all year round!





#### **SUMMER FAMILY MOVIE NIGHTS**

The new Summer Family Movie Nights program provided a series of free events, all dedicated to a skilled sector: construction, industrial, motive power, service, and technology. Each participating family was provided with a digital movie voucher and an activity kit dedicated to the sector theme of their choice.

Families chose when to redeem the movie voucher within a weekend rental window and do the hands-on activity together at any time. Kits were sent directly to households and included an educational guideline on the specific sector they selected.








#### **PODCAST & APP**





Skills Ontario launched the Trades & Tech Talk Podcast in April 2020. This was a new initiative, as Skills Ontario had never produced a podcast before.

In the Trades & Tech Talk podcast, Dan, Bill, and Madeline talk about 140+ careers in the skilled trades and technologies and how important, in demand and rewarding these careers are. Various guests include professionals who work in the skilled trades and tech apprenticeship representatives, college reps, educators, Skills Ontario staff, and many more.



## **JUNK DRAWER RACES**

The Paper Glider Competition program, launched in October 2020, asked students to work in teams to design and build a glider plane. The students were required to test their paper glider plane to see how far it could fly.

This fall, Skills Ontario is expanding the program to include tailored activities for specific grades in a series called Junk Drawer Races. The Paper Glider Competition is still available for grades 6-7, but new programs for grades 2-12 include a Gravity Powered Robot Walker Race, a Cardboard Car Race, and more.







### **NEW PUBLICATIONS, VIDEOS & APPAREL**

Skills Ontario revamped resources this year to assist educators and students looking for information on careers in the skilled trades and technologies. Four publications in total, including a brochure, a colouring book, a career guide, and a booklet on women in skilled careers, will be offered to students across the province.

We also have started the production over 60 new videos to act as inspiring and informative resources for students, including tours of skilled trade and tech workplaces, words of advice from skilled professionals, and more.

Skills Ontario also created and launched <u>a new line of apparel</u> to champion inclusivity in the trades. With slogans in English and French, such as "THIS IS WHAT A TRADESPERSON LOOKS LIKE", Skills Ontario continues to share the message that there is no right way for a tradesperson to look; these careers welcome all.
